Artist Biography

Thao P. Nguyen has been writing and performing solo shows since she joined the **Solo Performance Workshop** in 2007. She has been featured as a closing act at the **San Francisco Theater Festival** for 4 years running (2009-2012). Her full-length solo comedy, *Fortunate Daughter*, enjoyed a successful run at the 2012 **New York International Fringe Festival**, with rave reviews and sold out shows. In October 2012, *Fortunate Daughter* sold out every show of its San Francisco run at the **Stage Werx Theatre**. Nguyen's one-woman show will be featured in the Summer 2013 Season at **Impact Theater** in

Berkeley, California. The show is directed by Martha Rynberg and was originally directed by W. Kamau Bell. Rynberg is a solo theater director, the instructor of the **Solo Performance Workshop**, and the writer and performer of *Lady Parts*. Bell, who debuted his first television series *Totally*

Nguyen has produced such successful shows as "ATYPICAL: Stories from the Anomalous Asian American," "DIS-ORIENTED: A trio of Middle Eastern and Asian American women", "A Mother's Day Special: See Mom, I Didn't Forget!", "Best Feeding" by Martha Rynberg, "City Solo" at Off-Market Theater, and "Words First" at CounterPULSE.

Nguyen is holds a Master of Public Health (MPH) degree from the **University of California at Berkeley**, a Bachelor of Science degree in Psychology from **Brown University**. She is currently an instructor of public speaking and performance studies at **San Francisco State University**. She also is the Artistic Director for the **Asian Pacific Islander Cultural Center of San Francisco**.

Coming Out, Coming Home Fortunate Daughter Recommended By Lily Janiak, SF Weekly Entertainment Writer October 3, 2012

Fresh from an acclaimed run at the New York Fringe Festival, Thao Nguyen's solo show, Fortunate Daughter, is about her revealing her homosexuality to her parents without "coming out." The

coming-out narrative, she says, "is based on a lot of Western values," like individualism and the primacy of verbal communication, as well as a proclivity for binary thinking, none of which mesh with Nguyen's background and

worldview. Her character doesn't come out; she "comes home," partner in tow. For gays in many non-Western cultures, Nguyen says, if "you just keep on bringing that person home, it gives your family a chance to build a relationship with this person. Eventually



they just figure it out." In this show, Nguyen's home includes a jokester dad who, when his humor fails, "he fails hard," and a mother who once solved her daughter's grade school social problems by sending her to lunch at school with five extra Happy Meals, one for each of her bullies. Nguyen's family is from Vietnam, which just hosted its first ever Pride Parade this August. In her family, homophobia is also subsiding, but "slowly." "I'm not hiding my life from them at all," she says. "I'm just not saying the words."

Cultural indigestion, color-blindness and inter-ethnic vertigo. Is there a cure? Is it treatable? Is it contagious? This show features a dynamic trio of performers whose solo pieces and short films will lead you across a Muslim-Atheist supper table, the Mekong Delta, and Diagnostic Systems of Sexual Dysfunction. The show will leave you happy to be as DIS-oriented as the trio is!
